





OUR JOURNEY

Over the years in the early 2000s (factcheck), our group of passionate volunteers had conducted many fundraisers through entertainment events. Our shared experiences helped us realize that there are many grassroots organizations in communities around the world that are doing wonderful work but struggle to find the resources to keep going.

In January 2012, we founded Aram Sei to help us make a difference in communities worldwide through those grassroots charities by leveraging our fundraising skills. At our core, we believe in sustainability, volunteerism and giving back to society. Our goal is to provide platforms to these organizations that help raise their profiles and drive ongoing support thereby enabling them to sustain their growth. At Aram Sei, our donorship model depends on engaging with our local communities to make the act of paying it forward fun, and we do this through entertainment events for children of all ages.

Over the years, Aram Sei has grown beyond our traditional fundraising model. In 2020, due to the pandemic, we began exploring online fundraisers, webinars, and community engagement programs. These new avenues will help us reach new global audiences and make a difference in additional ways. We are constantly looking for people who are interested in joining our journey as we look to help more people around the world.

We are fortunate to have a large volunteer base in the Bay Area who are supported by their companies through volunteer time and dollar matching programs. Bay Area local businesses such as Madras Café/Groceries, Shasta Foods and MyTravelFare have been our steady supporters since the beginning. Through our concerted efforts, we have been able to support 17 projects over 5 countries with a direct impact on thousands of beneficiaries.


CAREavan - Union City, California


The CAREavan Program provides a safe, overnight parking for people and families living in their vehicles. The program is offered 7 days a week and was one of the two programs that were open in Union City amidst the shelter-in-place restrictions of the early pandemic days. The participants sleep in their vehicles and are provided restrooms that are open to them all night. At some locations, they also have access to showers and laundry facilities. However, there are too many restrictions involved around providing food. Helpful and thoughtful donors step in by bringing in prepared food so that all the participants need to do is warm it up in the microwave if needed. Before COVID-19, CAREavan was receiving 25 vehicles per night. These numbers went up after the onset of the pandemic.

Aram Sei helped support this program for approximately 45-60 participants through the end of the year 2020. Aram Sei expresses its gratitude and thanks to Mrs. Anuradha Sridhar, Director, Trinity Center for Music and parents of her students for helping us with the CAREavan program!








EVENTS IN 2020

South Asians for Black Lives is a webinar series raising awareness about racial injustice in our world and how to help the black community make long-term reform. The series features important conversations such as, "How can influence change?" and "As a person of color, this happens to me too." The webinar sessions go over a history of injustice and discuss what we can do to make a change for the future. In the first session, we covered the history of the Black community starting with slavery and the impactful contributions the community has made to society. This session focused on educating people who might not have been aware of the innovators and technologists in the Black community who shaped the world we live in now. The moderator for this panel was Anirvan Chatterjee, who is a technologist, activist, and storyteller from Berkeley, CA. We also held another session for teens, so that they could know how to make their thoughts heard and to empower them to use their voices to change the future. In the second session, members of the Black community spoke about the intersection between the South Asian and Black community. We discussed the shared history and how we can be allies for the Black community. The moderator for this session was Anu Natarajan, who is an ex-council member and Vice Mayor of Fremont. The panelists were Maya Perkins, governance, public policy and communications strategist, Colleen Tiffenson, a Restorative Justice Facilitator, and Lorna Harris-Fox, a compliance and ERG leader. In the final part of the series, a community leader spoke about how we as technologists, professionals, parents, and leaders can make long-term changes for the future. The speakers were Anu Natarajan, MR Ranjaswami, a software executive, investor, entrepreneur, corporate eco-strategy expert, community builder, and philanthropist, and Linton Johnson, the founder of Otis, an award-winning journalist, entrepreneur, and a communications executive. These webinars were important and effective in educating people on how to fight against injustices and make change happen.


AADHYA SRIDHARAN
